## Tips for Using AP Exams

## If you want to use the AP JUST for GE (and not talking about English):

- Use the AP Guide in the MCC catalog and look at the IGETC column
- Be careful with AP Envi Science they say it coves LAB but it only gives 3 units so you still need to add a 4 unit lab class in Area 5B
- If you are nervous about of a student has 58 or 59 units for goodness sake do not risk it and add a UC elective to make sure your student has 60+ units
- Do NOT duplicate the units. If you take the AP you cannot also get credit for the class.
  ex AP Psyc score of 3 or higher, and Psyc 101. Usually the first one is used and the second is an illegal repeat

## Oh that difficult English AP Lit and Lang:

- CSU will use a score of 3 with no issues
- UC this is complicated
  - If the score of 3 is not certified with IGETC/CalGETC, then it could be an issue for some UCs
  - If the student applied to some majors at UCB that do not take IGETC/CalGETC, they may not take a score of 3 and the student will not be admitted
  - And for a score of 4 or 5, UCD will not give the units for our ENGL 201 or 202 so you MUST make sure the student has 64 transfer units
  - (sigh please feel free to connect with Jed, Kristi, Jorge, or me if you have any questions)
- Private mmm private schools are persnickety and most will not take the AP score especially if the score is a 3. The student should review the private school website.

## IF you want to use the AP for MAJOR prep:

- CSU
  - Do not assume APs are used the same at each CSU. CSUSM and SDSU do not match. Check each website
- UC
  - Check EACH UC website for specific use and scores needed
  - If the score is too low to use, have the student take the class but remember not to double count the units.
  - Some UC will take the AP and other will not (PLSC for UCLA vs UCSD). Please refer those students to Transfer.
- Private -
  - Most will review for prerequisites, but many top tier privates will not give credit for major courses.
